#### **President's Corner**

Hello Summer! I hope you are enjoying the nice weather and long days. It will end before we know it. The Gentrain calendar and my term as your President will end with it. We will elect new officers at the first Wednesday Lecture in August.

My tenure as your President has coincided with our most recent journey through the Gentrain curriculum. As it has many times since its first offering, our examination of Western Civilization has taken us from speculation about archaeological artifacts from the early Stone Age, through growing volumes of written records, to the tangled web of information overload in today's world.

In addition to the fresh ideas and interpretations offered by our insightful faculty, we have adapted to a few new wrinkles this time, mostly due to the COVID-19 pandemic. #### Harriet tells her story:

Growing up in Baltimore, MD, I found my passion for dance and theatre early in life. I had excellent mentors and a most supportive mother. I graduated with a BFA from the Boston Conservatory in dance and theatre. Before graduation I obtained my Actors'



Equity card and for the next twelve years was pretty much a "gypsy." I was featured in National Broadway musicals including playing the role of Minnie Faye in *Hello*, *Dolly!* in two companies with leading ladies, Betty Grable and respectively, with Ginger Rodgers.

I was traveling throughout those years performing nationally and internationally and featured in top nightclub acts opening both the International Hotel and the MGM Grand in Las Vegas and performing at the Rainbow Room in NYC. Eventually, I wanted to come off the "road" and began teaching dance at two local colleges in Baltimore. I found myself back in an academic environment which I had always enjoyed. I started studying in 1975 t'ai chi and never looked back. Since 1981 I have taught thousands and was fortunate to travel the world teaching, lecturing and/or performing on various cruise ship lines throughout South East Asia, China and Europe. My present website www.montereycoastlife.com - offers more information about my weekly Zoom T'ai Chi classes. At present I am also the t'ai chi instructor at the Monterey Sports Center and Alila Ventana Big Sur.

While living in Baltimore I completed my studies and earned a M. S. degree in Administration from UMUC in College Park, MD while serving for three years as Executive Producer/Artistic Director of an awardwinning non-profit children's theatre company. I began teaching communications and t'ai chi for corporations, government agencies, educational and arts institutions, organizations, hospitals, businesses, etc. Articles I have written on the subject of t'ai chi are published in regional and national publications. In 1985 I founded Communications-Health/Network, Inc. (CH/N)and later an off-shoot, Heritage Theatre Artists' Consortium (www.h-tac.com) in 1995. I have performed a onewoman show I wrote, entitled Ella Shields: The Woman Behind the Man in London, NYC, Las Vegas, Maryland, the Queen Mary 2, as well as many theatre and museum venues. I also penned a bio of this legendary music hall entertainer now published in the Oxford Dictionary National Biography. (I presented a version of the "Ella Shields" program a few years back for a Gentrain Wednesday Lecture.).

As Artistic Director for ten years I served as director and choreographer of numerous musicals for a nationally-recognized Maryland-based senior theatre company (The 50+ Players). While active in museum theatre I developed living history and/oral history theatre programs for a variety of museums, libraries, theatres and educational organizations. (Visit www.h-tac.com for former program information.). As co-director of a living history theatre company for the

Maryland Historical Society, I directed original museum theatre for the 250th anniversary of the Civil War and the War of 1812.(Visit https://www.youtube.com/watch?v=bZZ1pOOWjqI).

In 2015 my husband and I made a decision to move to the Monterey Peninsula and finally settled into our present Carmel home in 2016. My husband, Ivan Kramer, Ph.D., now a retired physics professor from the University of Maryland (UMBC campus), happily pursues his interests here as well.

Since living on the Monterey Peninsula I have acted in various programs including some of Carol Marquart's staged play readings, been featured in Jane Press' *My Mother's Keeper*, and directed for the City of Monterey out-door living theatre presentations celebrating the 200th anniversary of the War of 1818 and commissioned to write the script and direct the 250th anniversary of Monterey (*Monterey 250 Mosaic Community Celebration*) which, unfortunately, due to Covid-19 restrictions, was forced to be cancelled for its June 3, 2020 out-door program.

## July 6, 2022 - 1:30 pm Sea Level Rise: The Most Serious Long-Term Consequence of Climate Change

The Greenhouse Effect, and its impact on the surface temperature of the Earth, has been known for over a hundred years. Long before there were satellites, computer models or even computers, scientists understood that the increasing use of fossil fuels that began with the Industrial Revolution would lead to a warming Earth and a changing climate. As the science has become much more definitive, specific and alarming, it has become clear that climate change presents an existential threat to the future of human civilization, with sea level rise sure to become the biggest problem facing the World in the next few centuries.



This presentation will begin with a brief overview of human-induced climate change and its consequences, and then focus on the specifics of sea level rise. This will include discussion of all the factors that affect sea level, both in the short and long term. Particular attention will be paid to the exceedingly long time lag between warming Earth and rising sea level, and the implications of this for future generations.

**Mike Clancy** earned a B.S. in Oceanography from Florida Institute of Technology in 1973 and a M.S. in

Meteorology from the University of Miami in 1975. He worked for Science Applications International in the late '70s and the Naval Research Lab in the early '80s. He joined the U.S. Navy's Fleet Numerical Meteorology and Oceanography Center (FNMOC)



in Monterey in 1983, and was selected as Technical and Scientific Director of FNMOC in 2005. Clancy authored over 100 publications in meteorology, oceanography and information technology, and received over 50 professional awards, including the Navy's Highest Civilian Award, prior to his retirement from Federal Service in 2011. Clancy was inducted into the FNMOC Hall of Fame in 2015. He is a frequent public speaker on climate change and currently serves as Chair of the Monterey County Chapter of the Citizens' Climate Lobby (CCL).

#### July 20, 2022 - 1:30 pm Bondmaker: Shaken, Not Stirred The Lives and Loves of lan Lancaster Fleming

At the United Artists Studios in 1964, promoting the release of the third Bond movie, *Goldfinger*, Fleming reviews his life as an embittered second son, journalist, merchant banker.

wartime intelligence officer and finally successful creator of the fabulous James Bond franchise...



Howard Burnham was born in Bournemouth, England, but claims American blood from his paternal grandfather, a much-traveled Californian mining engineer and WWI spy. Educated at Clayesmore School in Dorset and at University College in the University of Durham, Burnham has worked as a museum administrator, educator and actor. For fifteen years he

lived in Columbia, SC, working as a theatre artist for the SC Arts Commission and also depicting Revolutionary War personalities for the National Park Service. Moving to Pacific Grove in 2013, he has worked regularly with PacRep in Carmel. He is scheduled to play a small cameo in their upcoming *Mary Poppins* and a larger role in *School for Lies*.

## August 3, 2022 - 1:30 pm Higher Education in Emergencies Leveraging Refugee Potential for Sustainable Community Development

**Barbara Moser-Mercer** will introduce Education in Emergencies, and more specifically Higher Education

in Emergencies (HEiE), as part of a humanitarian response in contexts of conflict and crisis. We will explore how refugees living in camps in Sub-Saharan



Africa and the Middle East can access higher education; how humanitarian and development organisations, universities, private sector companies, refugee-led organisations and the government can work together to increase refugees' chances to become self-reliant and to find employment. We will look at the many barriers cultural, linguistic, environmental, security and political - that make Higher Education in Emergencies particularly challenging. With the global displaced population exceeding 90 million, more than 30 million of whom are refugees and asylum seekers with the majority having fled to developing countries, the humanitarian system is stretched beyond limits. Education at all levels is one of the key contributors to finding lasting solutions, and sustainability depends largely on local and regional approaches. We will look at concrete examples of how remote learning and locally relevant project-based learning can be successfully implemented and how refugee youth become the agents of change in their own communities.

Barbara Moser-Mercer is visiting professor at the University of Nairobi and currently leads the launch phase of the African Higher Education in Emergencies Network (AHEEN), designed to strengthen African solutions to the challenges of forced displacement on the continent. Following her initial training as a conference interpreter, she pursued her studies in psycholinguistics and cognitive psychology. Her research has focused on the development of expertise in

complex cognitive skills of bilinguals, both from a cognitive

psychology and a cognitive neuro-science perspective. These findings have been instrumental in informing the design and the development of student-centered multilingual digital learning



environments in fragile contexts, which she has leveraged across several refugee camps in Africa and the Middle East. She is professor emerita of the University of Geneva and started her academic career at the Middlebury Institute of International Studies as Dean of the Graduate School of Translation and Interpretation.



#### August 17, 2022 - 1:30 pm Dancing on the Belly of the Shark: Fishing "Tails" from Monterey Bay.

Monterey was a fishing town, and everything was fished from abalone to rockfish. People came from all over the world to make their living fishing the bay. With, Chinese fishermen, abalone divers from Japan, whalemen from

the Azores and Sicilians fishing sardines in the "dark of the moon." Monterey Bay was a multicultural stew. This program will look at the cultural history of Monterey's rich and always fascinating fishing industry. **Tim Thomas,** fourth-generation native of the Monterey area, is a fisheries historian who has researched the fisheries of Monterey Bay for over twenty-five years. He has researched, written and lectured extensively on Monterey's fishing communities and for sixteen years



was the Historian/Curator for the Monterey Maritime Museum. Tim is the co-author of *Monterey's Waterfront*, published in 2006, author of *The Japanese on the Monterey Peninsula*, published in 2010 and author of *The Abalone King of Monterey: "Pop" Ernest Doelter, Pioneering Japanese Fishermen & The Culinary Classic that Saved an Industry*, published in 2014.

He is Project Director and Editor of the J.B. Phillips Historical Fisheries Report, a project that produces lectures, symposia and a publication that focuses on the history, the science, the people and the status of the fisheries of the Monterey Bay.

Tim is also the historical consultant for the Monterey Bay Aquarium and has worked and developed programs for Monterey Bay National Marine Sanctuary and California State Parks. Tim has been featured on PBS, BBC and on C-span. He is also on the Board of Directors of the Monterey Japanese American Citizens League and curator of Japanese American Heritage Center. He has traveled and lectured extensively on the Monterey Japanese community both here and in Japan.

In 2008, Tim was the guest curator for the exhibit, Abalone as Food and Beauty at the Awa Museum in

Tateyama Japan.
