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

President's Corner

Fellow Greetings!

Gentrainers,



As I assumed the position of President, the words of an old (well, 1966) song came to mind: "What's it all about, Alfie?" I don't know much about Alfie, but I will try to answer this for Gentrain!

The Society was formed to support the GENTRAIN Program of MPC. As many of you know, GENTRAIN is an acronym for General Education Train of Courses. Okay, so what is that? It is a program to "provide an interdisciplinary education experience so that realms as diverse as literature, the sciences, music and art and their interrelationships could be appreciated and comprehended." MPC faculty provide the courses that carry out this mission. What do we do? We are given the mission to support the Gentrain Program, the intellectual, cultural, and social interests of our members, the community, and the college.

What do we actually do? We provide operational support to faculty who teach in the Program; help instructors with daily administrative details of lectures; help recruit students; and raise funds to support faculty in advancing their knowledge base and teaching skills. Recently we established a check-out library of books and other materials that relate directly to course content. We run a bi-monthly lecture series (Wednesday Lecture series) to enhance and expand the intellectual horizons of our members. Other activities that support intellectual and cultural interests include group excursions to local and Bay Area theaters and museums. For many years we have organized and run charter buses to the Oregon Shakespeare Festival at Ashland. In 1991 the Gentrain Society Scholarship Fund was established in order to provide funding to encourage older returning students to continue their education. We keep the social life of our members in mind by organizing events such as picnics, end of term oncampus tea and coffee get-togethers and related events. I think we have done an outstanding job in fulfilling the

above mission. But, there are some dark clouds on the horizon. During the 2+ years reign of COVID we lost a number of our members, and student registrations also dropped. We were unable to provide the full spectrum of the above activities. On the positive side contributions to our Scholarship Fund increased due to the generosity of our existing members. My major concern over the next year is to work with the Gentrain Board to recruit new members to the Gentrain Society and to find ways to encourage those members who we lost during COVID to rejoin. We will need to expand the activities that we offer to attract new members and retain existing ones. We need to "sell" the value of Gentrain to our community by showcasing the ways we add to the intellectual and cultural life of the community.

I would ask our members to get in touch with me or any Board Member with ideas for new activities or enhancements to our existing programs. I will keep members informed about how we are doing.

Finally, we all owe Mary Alice Rennick a huge vote of thanks for the great job she did during her two year term as President. Her efforts kept the Society focused on how to support our members during a very harrowing couple of years.

November 2, 2022 - 1:30 pm Family Travel Diaries

In June of 1929, the poet Robinson Jeffers, his wife Una, and their 12-year-old twin sons left Tor House, their home on Carmel Point. and set sail for Ireland, the first stop on their sevenmonth journey through the British Isles. As thev traveled, each member of the family contributed to iournal, chronicling their descriptions and vivid



reactions to the things they saw. *The Robinson Jeffers Family Travel Diaries, Vol. One* is a transcription of the original diary, with its vitality and immediacy. Deborah Sharp will explain why the diaries are valuable in understanding the Jeffers family and the poet himself.

Deborah Whittlesey Sharp, retired MPC instructor, has been affiliated with the Robinson Jeffers Tor House Foundation for 20 years as a tour docent and former trustee. Her transcription of the first volume of *The Travel Diaries* was published last January.



November 16, 2022 - 1:30 pm Travel the Culinary World with Chef Mary Chamberlin



December 7, 2022 - 1:30 pm History in Miniature: County's History on Display at the Railroad Museum

Railroads were instrumental in transforming Monterey

County into what it is today, influencing where people settled, how the agriculture industry evolved and how the Salinas Valley became the salad bowl of the world. Since the early 1990s, a group of model railroad enthusiasts has researched this history and worked to



tell the story by building an elaborate model railroad that recreates the system. The Monterey and Salinas Valley Railroad Museum is located in the historic Railway Express Agency building adjacent to the Salinas Amtrak station. A sign at the entrance reads "Take a journey into the past when everything traveled by rail."



Dana Peterson is a retired Monterey County Sheriff's Office detective sergeant and longtime model railroad enthusiast. He has volunteered with the MSVRR museum for 22 years.

So we (Gentrain Society Board Members Ruth Alota, Melissa Newlin and myself, Terry Blum) decided to set up a table with literature about our Gentrain Program (Tuesday/Thursday morning classes and instructors). We encouraged the students to check out the classes, possibly to take a single unit or a semester or four semesters of units. We also walked around to the different information tables (eg. MPC Counselors) passing out literature about the Gentrain Program. We noticed a number of new students on September 20, the first day of the new unit which directly followed the event. Maybe the table was a bit effective.





GENTRAIN INSTRUCTORS

Alan Haffa (Literature)

Alan grew up in Minnesota and is a first generation college student. He went to St. John's College in Annapolis, Maryland, which has a "great books" program. At St. John's he decided that his career path was to become a professor. Alan got married before his junior year at St. John's to his wife, Arlene, They moved to Wisconsin where Arlene had a research assistantship, and Alan got a job teaching seventh grade English and Science at a Catholic boarding school for Mexican boys. The next year he went to graduate school and joined the Comparative Literature Program at the University of Wisconsin-Madison. He earned an MA in Comparative Literature and then an MA in Classics. The Haffas moved to Arizona where Alan taught History, Literature, and Philosophy in the Liberal Arts Department at Phoenix College, and after one year he ran the Honors Program and a Classical Studies Program.

Tom Logan (History)

Tom Logan's childhood, with a mother at home, a sister six years younger than himself and a geologist father, was relatively normal until the family moved to the Belgian Congo when he was eleven. At the age of 13 they visited Egypt before going on to live in Turkey. "That just blew me away," he said excitedly..."all those great ruins and then the Hittites! I knew I wanted to be an ancient historian." "I read a book that said the University of Colorado was the most beautiful school in the world. I went there as a freshman. It was too big. I opted into Foothill Junior College for a couple of years, and then Berkeley where I graduated in History with a minor in Anthropology. Then I went to the University of Chicago." While at UC Tom worked as a curator at the Oriental Institute. After teaching Ancient History in New York City for three years, he moved to the venerable Metropolitan Museum of Art. "There, as an Egyptologist, I did the installation of five galleries, from Dynasty 19 to Dynasty 30." In 1981 Tom came to Carmel as Director of the Monterey Peninsula Museum of Art. And he is still pursuing his dream - discovering ancient Egyptian ruins.

Stephanie Spoto (Philosophy)

Stephanie Spoto teaches Humanities at California State University, Monterey Bay and Philosophy at Monterey Peninsula College. She holds a PhD in English Literature from The University of Edinburgh, with her doctoral work exploring the influence of esoteric and occult philosophy on early modern literature and politics. In 2013 she was an International Visiting Research Fellow at the Centre for Advance Study - Sofia (Bulgaria), with support for her project "William Lithgow (1582-1645) and Early Modern Scottish Journeys to Eastern Europe". Stephanie has talked literature and philosophy on The SRB Podcast and Not Radio, and has been the coordinator of a community philosophy reading group at Old Capitol Books in downtown Monterey for four years.

Gamble Madsen (Art/Architecture)

Gamble Madsen is originally from Claremont, California and specializes in the visualization of Christian theology in Medieval and Renaissance contexts. She attended the University of Southern California as an undergraduate and graduate student, ultimately earning a PhD in Medieval Art History. She also holds a degree in Museum Studies from George Washington University, and has worked in collections management for institutions in New York (Lowy Fine Art) and Los Angeles (LACMA). She came to MPC in 2012 and currently teaches surveys in Western and Asian Art along with a course focused on the Renaissance period.


