

Got A Pen?? Need A Catchy Tee Shirt???



Sun, *The Play That Got Away* (a comic who-done-it play within a play), *Timon of Athens*, and *Coriolanus*.



March 15, 2023 - 1:30 pm **A Titan Of Monterey History - Mr. Pat Hathaway**



The Monterey County Historical Society, Inc. is the beneficiary and custodian of one of the most important image collections of its kind on the West Coast. **Mr. Pat Hathaway** passed away suddenly in January of 2021; the Society had enjoyed a relationship with him since the 1970s. Its principal concern was to maintain his collection, protected and preserved in Monterey County. To this end, they petitioned the Superior Court-appointed Trustees, Kent Seavey and estate lawyer Joseph Ferry, to become custodians of Mr. Hathaway's collection.

Between January 6 through 12, 2022 the Society's Executive/Director/Curator James Perry and volunteers committed a total of 80 hours at Mr. Hathaway's residence in Pacific Grove preparing for the collection relocation to the MCHS campus. And the MCHS is committed to making the collection accessible by having it entirely digitized.

We welcome James Perry as a guest speaker. He has an M.A. in Museum Studies with an emphasis on Collections Management and Public History. He has served as Curator of Collections and Exhibits for the Valdez Museum and Historical Archive in Valdez,



Alaska as well as the Museum of the Aleutians in Dutch Harbor, Alaska. Locally, he has served as consultant to various organizations for special project initiatives, including the City of Carmel-by-the-Sea, the Royal Presidio Chapel and Missions Carmel, San Juan Bautista, Soledad, and San Antonio de Padua. He has served the Monterey County Historical Society in various capacities since 1990, and is currently the Society's Executive Director and Curator.

The Monterey County Historical Society was founded in 1933 and its collections are vast and varied. They are essentially the custodians of the majority of local/regional records from the 1770s through the 1940s.

Charles Ponzi: The True Story Behind the Legend

He was a short man, barely five feet tall, but his sparkling smile, twinkling eyes and natty dress made him a giant in the eyes of his followers. His promises seemed too good to be true: a 50 percent return on their investments in 45 days, a 100 percent return in 90 days. But some investors actually received it! For eight months in 1920, the people of Boston considered him a genius, a financial wizard who understood the

workings of investment and international finance better than anyone. For the 90-plus years since, he has been considered a crook, the godfather of some of the worst financial schemes in history that have destroyed countless lives.

In this talk, revered educator and lecturer Larry Tartaglino presents a new, revealing look into the life and background of the namesake of the infamous Ponzi scheme. He promises that, at its conclusion, you'll never look at Charles Ponzi in quite the same way.



After a successful business career, guest speaker Larry Tartaglino turned to education and spent many years as an award-winning college lecturer. He currently gives highly sought-after talks for the cruise line industry.

Monterey County Civil Grand Jury - How Can You Become Involved?

Many residents have heard of the Monterey County Civil Grand Jury, but few are familiar with the duties and inner workings of this important entity. Join members of the 2020-2021 Grand Jury as they explain the grand jury process and how you can participate. From actually serving on the jury to learning about filing complaints, this is one of the most fascinating citizen groups available to the public in Monterey County.

The Monterey County Civil Grand Jury (MCCGJ) investigates and provides reports on the operations of local government in Monterey County, including the county, cities and numerous special districts that exist to

serve its residents. The Civil Grand Jury undertakes investigations on its own initiative, but also encourages residents to submit written complaints that it may investigate.



Tom Mastre and Maria Garcia will be providing a lot of information about the functioning of the Grand Jury system and how local citizens might participate in the process. Tom, from Salinas, was a member of the 2020/2021 Civil Grand Jury. After a long and winding career, Tom retired from the Naval Post Graduate School as a Senior Lecturer and principal investigator for distance learning research projects. Maria, from Marina, was a member of the 2019/2020 and 2020/2021 Civil Grand Jury. She served as the Foreperson for both terms. Maria worked for the University Corporation, an auxiliary organization of CSUMB, for nearly 15 years before taking a career pause to spend more time with her parents.

MPC Spring Gentrain Program

February 21, 23, 28 - March 2, 7, 9, 14, 16
GENT 405: THE MEDIEVAL WORLD: PART I (400-1100 CE)

The course begins with a look at the Western world after the collapse of Rome. It then traces the incursion of the Germanic tribes into the West and the culture which was produced by the combination of Roman, Christian, and Germanic elements: its theology, art and architecture, and literature. A brief excursion into the Byzantine world relieves the gloom of the darkest ages in Western history.

March 28, 30, April 4, 6, 11, 13, 18, 20

GENT 406: THE MEDIEVAL WORLD: PART II (1100-1350)

The course studies the period sometimes called 'the first Renaissance' in Europe: the great Christian Age in Europe - the age of Thomas Aquinas, cathedrals, the Crusades, courtly love and Dante. It is also an age of economic recovery, the growth of towns and cities and the establishment of the great universities of Europe.

April 25, 27, May 2, 4, 9, 11, 16, 18

GENT 407: THE EARLY RENAISSANCE (1350-1520)

The course examines the changes in Western life and thought that resulted from the rediscovery of the classical ages of Greece and Rome. It features many of the places, figures and events that define the Renaissance, including Florence, the Medici, the growth of trade and cities, new music, literature, art and philosophy, Machiavelli, the Hundred Years War, Chaucer and the beginnings of the great art of the Renaissance: Leonardo da Vinci and Raphael.



Bruce Ariss Was Here: A Monterey, California Artist Remembered

Ariss was an artist in Monterey, California, and friends with John Steinbeck and Ed Ricketts. He is known for illustrating the fishing industry along Cannery Row.

Painter, printmaker, muralist, and theater set designer Bruce Wallace Ariss, Jr., was born in White Salmon, Washington, on October 10, 1911. His family relocated to Oakland, California, when Ariss was a child. After graduation from Oakland Technical High School he enrolled at the University of California, Berkeley, working as art editor for *The Pelican* and *The Occident*, and earning extra cash as a heavyweight boxer.

After graduating with his B.A. in 1934, Ariss took a job as a heavy machinery operator for a gold mine, pursuing art on his own time. He managed to save \$200 (approximately \$3,000 today), affording him and his spouse Jean the ability to take an extended trip to Monterey in 1935, where they quickly settled. To make ends meet, the Arises briefly took over publication of local literary magazine *The Monterey Beacon*, through which they would publish works by John Steinbeck, William Saroyan, and Ed Ricketts, among others.


Not long after their arrival in Monterey Ariss found employment with the WPA's Federal Arts Project, in both the graphics and mural divisions, creating several works that can still be found in the Monterey Peninsula in California. His lithographs from this time often centered on the working class life of Cannery Row, depicting fishermen and dock workers as well as shipwrecks and other happenings along the coast. Among his many contributions to the city was the execution of a mural in the Pacific Grove High School library, a three-wall project created in collaboration with August Gay, depicting the Monterey coastline from Point Pinos to the Custom House. It took three years to complete; sadly, it burned down in 1946.

In the late 1940s he collaborated with artist Angelo Di Girolamo to design, build, and paint the Wharf Theater, which was completed in 1950 and led to commissions for theater set design on the Bing Crosby Show, *I Love Lucy*, and other Hollywood productions. In the 1980s he designed a massive mural project for Cannery Row from old mural sketches he made for the WPA. Ariss enlisted fifty young artists to execute fifty-two eight-foot wide mural sections, taking a total of five years to complete. The mural remains today and was subsequently the catalyst to rename the street it runs along as "Bruce Ariss Way."

In addition to public and private works, Ariss taught art at the Defense Language Institute located in the Monterey Presidio. He also wrote his own science fiction novel and illustrated Reginald Bretnor's sci-fi novel *Through Time and Space* with Ferdinand Feghoot (1962). In 1989, a major retrospective of Ariss' work was held at the Pacific Grove Art Center, which included his oil paintings, watercolors, and mural sketches and lithographs from his WPA days.

Bruce W. Ariss died in Monterey, California on September 1, 1994.
