### **President's Corner**

Fellow Gentrainers, Greetings!



As the Academic Year (AY25) and the Fiscal Year(FY25) are rapidly nearing the end I am happy to report that both the GENTRAIN Society (the Society and the GENTRAIN Program (the Program) had successful years. The dedicated faculty who teach, organize

and integrate subject matter for each of the four-courses that make up the Program have continued to make the Program challenging and rewarding for both credit-earning students and registered local community members. The Society has supported the Program by expanding the intellectual components of the Program by organizing a lecture series by outside speakers, visits to museums and other education activities, materials needed to support student access to needed educational assets and through a scholarship program for adult students registered at MPC.

The Program has received continuing support from the College through the provision of teaching budgets that cover not only the direct lecturing activities of the faculty, but adding teaching budget units to support a coordinator, team teaching activities, faculty attending classes of other program faculty, group coordination efforts. This "extra" teaching budget has been a major factor in the Program's development and effectiveness over the last 50 plus years of the Program. However, the AY26 faculty budget zero's out this "extra" teaching budget. MPC is clearly under extreme pressure to reduce expenses, but this action would essentially close a highly effective and faculty/administrator designed program for MPC students and adult learners. Is this the best action to take?

The Society Board will work with MPC administration to see how this action can be reversed or mitigated before the next academic year begins. Society members can help in the effort through their contacts with MPC Board of Trustees, MPC administrative officers, or other interested parties.

# Wednesday, July 16, 1:30 pm The Declaration of Independence: An Enduring Solution for the Challenges of Our Time



Professor Richard Kezirian will focus on the Declaration of Independence as a statement of principles, emphasizing that those principles are among the noblest in world history. After reviewing key sections of the Declaration, Dr. Kezirian will ask if the time has come to reclaim our nation's patrimony by recognizing its national commitment to equality.

In Homer's *Odyssey*, crafty Odysseus faced the irresistible song of the Sirens, adapted to each listener. Have the internet algorithms of today created a digital Siren song that confirms what each of us wants to hear, enveloped as we are in an invisible, personalized "filter bubble?" Dr. Kezirian will suggest that the Declaration's lofty ideals can inspire us once more to promote community and egalitarian values, countering the malign neglect so often fostered by the bubbles that characterize our individualized online lives.

Richard Kezirian is Professor Emeritus, Monterey Peninsula College, after a forty-year teaching career, and currently a professor at The Panetta Institute for Public Policy. He has also taught as an adjunct professor at the Naval Postgraduate School and the Monterey Institute of International Studies. Kezirian was the recipient of the Allen Griffin Award for Excellence in Teaching in 1986 and the Monterey Peninsula College President's Award in 2014. He received his Ph.D. in History from the University of California at Santa Barbara.

# Wednesday, August 6, 1:30 pm Ancient Egyptian Astronomy as a Portal to the Afterlife

For the ancient Egyptians the night sky was a phenomenon. With clear skies and no electricity, the Milky Way was truly milky. So the belief arose that the Milky Way was produced by a celestial goddess: a cow goddess. In addition, the night sky seemed alive. Over weeks there was




(and is) movement that can be discerned. And the star Sirius would first appear in the morning sky just as the Nile entered flood stage. Thus the stars and constellations must be divine.

### Ballade du Temps Jadis (The Ballad of the Dead Ladies) [translation by Dante Gabriel Rossetti]


TELL me now, in what hidden way is

## To access MyMPC, first log in to your Lobo Apps account.

Go to <a href="https://mpc-edu.clearlogin.com/login">https://mpc-edu.clearlogin.com/login</a>, enter your credentials and click the Log In button. (If you have trouble, follow the help link in the lower right hand corner of the screen.)

An assortment of application options will appear. SelectMyMPC.

Open the Registration Dashboard.

Several choices will be offered. Explore them at will. To follow the most direct path to Gentrain registration, select "Register for Classes".

Select term—Fall 2025; Click Continue

A search box appears at the top of the screen. If you have already registered for any Fall 2025 courses, they will be displayed in the lower part of the screen. You can use this to search by Subject for Gentrain and or World Civilization courses or by CRN (Course Reference Number). All courses that match your criteria will be listed. View the details (time, dates, credits) by clicking on an item.

The most efficient way to register only for Gentrain is to click "Enter CRNs", from menu across the top of the Search Box.


If you have previously registered for fall classes, you will probably see a full-width upper panel in with instructions to "Enter Course Registration Numbers" and two half width panels "Class Schedule" and "Summary" below it. If the "Summary" panel it is not visible, do one of two things.

Click on the "Panels" tab in the lower left part of the screen.

Find the three icons near the bottom center of the screen. Click on the middle icon. Find the CRNs for the sections you want to add from this table.

Enter the CRNs, one at a time, in the "Enter CRNs" panel. When you have finished, your "Summary" panel will look something like this:



Click the arrow in each Action Dropbox in the righthand column. (You may need to scroll your window to see it.) Select "Add".

If you make a mistake, select "Remove" in the Dropbox.

Click the Submit button in the lower right corner of the screen. Look for a "Save Successful" message.

#### Payment.

Unlike the old WebReg system, MyMPC allows you to register for classes without paying your fees. You must pay them by the end of the semester, however, or you will be unable to register for the following semester. In any case, you must initiate the payment process yourself. For comprehensive instructions, consult the MyMPC Portal Student Guide link to "How do I pay for classes". Bear in mind that the financial data are updated overnight. It may be best to wait until the day following your registration to pay your fees. Some Gentrain-specific notes.

### Fees listed on MPC website are

- \$46 Tuition (per unit)
- \$20 Health fee
- \$10 Student Center fee
- \$10 Student Body fee
- \$02 Student Representative fee

Note that there is no tuition for non-credit courses. The Health and Student fees apply to everyone. However, several students have reported different charges. The Admissions and Records people advise patience. The procedure itself is reasonably simple. From the MyMPC screen, open the Student Dashboard (different from the Registration Dashboard).

Select "Pay Student Fees" from the list of available actions. This takes you to a TouchNet page. (TouchNet is the service MPC has chosen to process electronic financial transactions.) Your Balance Due is displayed at the top of the screen.

If the balance is \$0, you can go no further. Either wait until the fiscal office initiates contact or request help from student\_billing@mpc.edu

If a payment is due, click the Make a Payment button. If this is the first time you have used TouchNet, you will be asked to set up a payment method (credit card, bank transfer, etc.) When your account is set up, you can make your payment.


