

Wednesday, Nov. 19, 2025,1:30pm The Wonderful Wizard of Oz An American Fairy Tale

In 1902 The Wonderful Wizard of Oz by L. Frank Baum was published. In 2000 the Library of Congress called the book "America's greatest and best- By L. Frank Baun loved homegrown fairytale." Others have called it the "quintessential American fairy tale." L. Frank Baum 1856-1919 was born in NY, moved to Chicago and ended up in California. During his lifetime he wrote 55 novels, 83 short

stories and 53 scripts including 13 more Oz books, short stories and scripts. But is The Wonderful Wizard of Oz just a children's book, or is there a deeper meaning? Tom will discuss the book, its possible meaning and mention the other Oz books.

In the 1890s Baum was a supporter of the Populist Party and its presidential candidate William Jennings Bryan. The Populist Party advocated for the

farmers and laborers. Can one see reflections of their beliefs in the book?

depression and body image concerns. Krista Reuther will explain how to support teens in using social media wisely.


Krista Reuther, LCSW, MPH, is assistant director of Montage Health's Ohana campus, a behavioral health center for children and adolescents.

The course studies the causes, events, central figures and consequences of the French Revolution and the Napoleonic Age. Additionally, it examines the connections between this historical foundation and the philosophy, literature and art, including such figures as Rousseau, Kant, Wordsworth, Goethe, Goya and Beethoven.
