Students who wish to attend "for credit" should refer to the Fall 2023 MPC catalogue. The first day of class will be Tuesday, August 22.

Registration is done online through the MPC website. Go to www.mpc.edu. Select WEBREG from the menu at the top of the home page. Or go dirctly through https://webreg.mpc.edu/. Sign in using your MPC ID number and password. Select ADD/DROP/ REG. The term will be Fall 2023. Enter section number 0525 for the non-credit sections of Gentrain. If you enter 0525 as the first section, the system may automatically offer to add the other three sections (0532, 0538, & 0546). More complete instructions: www.gentrain.org.



Meet the Gentrainer - Ed Mellinger Rene Kimzey

Like the hat? Go further and meet the multi-faceted person wearing it, Ed Mellinger, a first cycle Gentrain student. Regretting his lack of attention to History in his previous formal education, Ed says he is grateful for the Gentrain experience which in his retirement years has added "the first glimmerings of appreciation for the sweep of history."



Ed grew up in Virginia where his dad worked on mathematics of classification testing for the Army and his mom chaired the Psychology Department at George Mason University, His brother is a marine acoustics mammal researcher with NOAA and Oregon State University and his sister is pediatrician/ а researcher with the

CDC. While in high school, Ed played in band and orchestra, worked in theater tech, pursued his interest in the confluence of art and technology and robotic probes of distant worlds, but his fascination with electricity from age eight led him to "impatiently" pursue an Electrical Engineering degree at Swathmore College. After graduation, he fortuitously cold-called Woods Hole Oceanographic Institution (WHOI) the very day they had an EE opening. During his eight years at WHOI, he worked on shipboard computers, instrument systems, and underwater vehicles. Later taking a position with NASA Ames, he transitioned to payload integration aboard a DC-8 research plane, flying over the Americas, Pacific Rim and Europe. His final career move was to the then recently-founded Monterey Bay Aquarium Research Institute (MBARI) to develop the power system for the ROV Tiburon and the propulsion and control systems for the Tethys class of long-range autonomous vehicles.

In 1990, Ed met Pam Hopkins who had just finished a year-long solo trip around the world. They married in 1993 and have one son, Peter, who enrolled in the first class of the International School of Monterey. Peter is now a grad student in Microbiology and Molecular Genetics at UC Berkley, hoping to work on biofuels, artificial photosynthesis or beer brewing(??!!).

Gentrain had interested Ed soon after moving to Monterey, but work prevented him from attending the weekday classes. After retiring in 2022, he noted an ad in the Herald for the Gentrain Program and his long dormant interest was reawakened. With a long commute from Carmel Valley, he misses the online option for the classes, but attends regularly and hopes to go on some of the travel events. As an "heretical" suggestion, he would like to see a parallel Gentrain track on the history of science.

Ed says he was fortunate to have had work that took him to distant places with involvement in the local culture, from deploying a mooring under pack ice off Svalbard to flying through a typhoon near Guam. In retirement, however, "It's equally meaningful to fix up an old house, ride my mountain bike, and try to grow apricot trees in the Valley."

Gentrain Society Scholarship Fund at Monterey Peninsula College Vikki Logan, Scholarship Chair

In 1993 I accepted the Chair position following Kathy Kress. All the groundwork had been done with great efficiency. Keeping in mind our motto is "Lifelong Learning," it was decided that our scholarships would be for returning students. I had no idea how rewarding the experience would be, especially working with the Scholarship Committees and the recipients and following them on their path to success. All the students want the Gentrain Society to know what a thrill it is to be chosen and how much the recognition means to them!

The program would not have happened without the seed money from an anonymous donor. When asked why he came up with the idea of starting the program, this was part of his response: "Education has been so terribly important in my life because it opened a new world to me and provided avenues to an enjoyable professional life. With the GI Bill and a lot of hard work, I went from a third quarter freshman to a PhD. Even my postdoctoral work was with the help of a scholarship."

By providing a matching fund of \$2,000 annually for the first seven years, the scholarship program was off to a great start and it has continued to grow for 30 years now. We all know about the excellence of the MPC faculty, and on each of the applications the students confirm this to be true. As an example I quote one of them: "This spring will be my last semester, and I will be sorry to leave. Over the past two years I have been fortunate enough to be educated by the dedicated, compassionate, and deeply knowledgeable staff here. The instructors focus on not only providing a stellar education but on additional opportunities for all their students."

Over the years we have helped a variety of students from different backgrounds, some of them homeless. I remember one man in particular who was homeless and used the computers at his church to do his homework. His dedication to his studies enabled him to obtain a degree and lift him out of poverty. There are so many success stories and I try to shine a light on each individual by providing articles to our bi-monthly newsletter, *The Conductor*.

Over the last 30 years we have awarded \$452,000. Just think of the lives we have changed for the better! We have affected many generations by giving scholarships to parents who come to MPC for retraining. They are a great example to their children by teaching them the value of an education.

Thanks to the many Gentrain Society members that have volunteered to be on the Scholarship Committee over the years, insuring the success of the program.

You probably have noticed that we gave numerous scholarships to nurses. Rene Kimzey is on the Scholarship Committee, and she wrote a note about the nursing profession (she is a retired nurse) which we would like to share:

"I know there was some concern about nurses who go on to expensive schools to obtain their BSN. If you remember when the applications were so impossible, the numbers dropped, nurses were the ones that persevered through the process. If you look at the courses they take, and I have taken them all, Chemistry, Microbiology, Anatomy and Physiology, etc. are very difficult courses, and many have three credits but require hours of extra lab time. As I understand it, after completing the MPC program they may sit for their exam, and if they pass, can practice and continue to work toward their BSN. So please don't avoid rewarding hard-working people who want to provide a service to mankind. I am proud of my profession and want to support those who now must fill in for the many health care givers who burned out or died during Covid. Just some thoughts,



July 5, 2023 - 1:30 pm The Murder of Rasputin, A Staged Reading by Carol Marquart

This is a story of the murder of Grigori Efimevich Rasputin on December 17, 1916. A simple Siberian peasant, Rasputin was many things to many people. To his daughter, Maria, he was a holy but imperfect man. To his assassin Prince Felix Yusupov, he was an imposter and the Antichrist who crawled out of the dark ages. To The Tsarina Alexandra, he was Father Grigory, her savior and an



envoy from God. What was the source of Rasputin's power, and why did his gruesome murder mark the beginning of the end of Tsarist Russia? This staged reading is not only about a murder but about the end of an empire!



Carol Marquart, playwright, is fascinated with the lives of famous people and revolutionary thinkers. Using local actors, she has written and presented her staged readings all over the Monterey Peninsula. Her character studies include Diana, Princess of Wales, Kurt Vonnegut Jr., Mark Twain, The Duchess of

Windsor, William Randolph Hearst, J. Paul Getty, Bette Davis, Louella Parsons, Hedda Hopper, Mabel Dodge Luhan and Rasputin!

July 19, 2023 - 1:30 pm Ed Ricketts and Science

Historian Donald Kohrs will be talking about Doc



Ricketts. He is a historian and Branch Library Specialist at the Miller Library of Stanford University's Hopkins Marine Station Pacific Grove, in researching, among other things, marine biologist Ed Ricketts and the publication of Between Pacific Tides, a study of inter-tidal ecology in 1939. Kohrs offers answers to

questions such as why it took Stanford University Press nine years to publish Ricketts' study and whether Ricketts was isolated from the scientific community of Hopkins Marine Station, as has often been suggested.

August 2, 2023 - 1:30 pm The Boeing 747, Jeff Ohlson's Memoirs, 1966-1971

After producing over 1,500 747s, Boeing delivered the last one earlier this year - marking the end of the production life of one of the most iconic airplanes in aviation history. **Jeff Ohlson** will recount the 747's early days and what it was like to be a young engineer working on aviation's first wide-body commercial airplane. He will also talk about becoming a historian for Carmel Valley



Jeff was born and schooled in Rhinelander, Wisconsin. In 1966, he graduated from the University of Minnesota with a BS in Aeronautical Engineering and then hired by Boeing and assigned to the original 747 Flight Deck group. After a 38-year career in Flight Deck Design and Flight Crew Operations, he retired in 2004. He and his wife Cherie now live in Carmel Valley. In 2012 Jeff volunteered for the Carmel Valley Historical Society where he has now curated numerous museum exhibits and authored and published several histories about Carmel Valley.

August 16, 2023 - 1:30 pm The Chumash Group and a New Marine Sanctuary



Dr. Stephen Palumbi is the Jane and Marshall Steel Jr. Professor of Marine Sciences, Professor of Oceans and of Biology who works for Stanford University out of the Marine Hopkins Marine Station. Steve has long been fascinated by how quickly the world around us changes. Work on the genomics of marine organisms tries to focus on basic evolutionary questions but also on practical solutions to questions about how to preserve and protect the diverse life in the sea. Dr. Palumbi will be speaking about the work they're doing with the Chumash group near Morro Bay in their drive to create a new national marine sanctuary and how we put western science and Chumash approaches together.
